As Our Organization Grows Executive Director Andy Pollock Now Full-Time!



It's a sure sign that our small organization, founded by far-sighted volunteers just five years ago, is maturing and growing: Andy Pollock, our part-time Executive Director from the very beginning, is now managing Coastal Neighbors full-time! "I believe strongly in the Village concept, and I love the people we serve and the people who volunteer. They have become friends--family," he says.

You undoubtedly know Andy--he's the guy who's always there when you call or email or attend an event, welcoming you with a smile and eagerness to help. But you may not be familiar with his impressive background. A Dartmouth native, Andy was raised right where he lives now, on Silverbrook Farm, then a horse farm operated by his parents. A proud product of the Dartmouth public schools (his mom was an art teacher), he went on to receive a BS from Penn State and an MBA from the University of Maine. He is also trained as a Certified Nursing Assistant.

Andy's early career was in business, including partnership in a medical billing firm, followed by 15 years as a successful farmer and later as a nursing assistant. All along the way, he's felt called to "give back" in some way--through his Christian and Quaker traditions, volunteering with hospice, just reaching out to people in need. Another important aspect of giving back is his activism in LGBTQ advocacy. A gay man himself, Andy has been a leader for LGBTQ rights for decades, particularly here on the South Coast. He is the current President of the South Coast LGBTQ+ Network.

"We've been so fortunate to have Andy working with us since our first steps as an organization," says Coastal Neighbors' President Steve Kiechel. "We're excited that he's now leading us into the next chapter."

Partnership With ARAW The Older and The Newer Join Forces to Help Neighbors

Coastal Neighbors Network, one of the area's youngest charitable organizations, is partnering with the Association for the Relief of Aged Women (ARAW), one of the oldest charities on the South Coast. Under a grant through ARAW's Community Partner program, ARAW beneficiaries in Dartmouth and Westport are now eligible, regardless of financial resources, to become Coastal Neighbors Service Members. That means our volunteers will answer their requests for transportation, tasks around the house, friendly visits and all the other services we offer. When ARAW was founded in 1856, its goal was "not alms alone, but a friend." That mission has remained the same through 156 years: to furnish financial assistance, provide friendship, and promote the welfare of elderly women in need. Jim grew up in Saginaw, Michigan, where he started farming as a young boy and developed a love of farming and respect for the earth that stayed with him throughout his life. In his work as a professor for 30 years at Roger Williams College and later as a farmer in Dartmouth, Jim was an ambassador for water quality, climate change and the fate of our planet. He and his wife Carol raised four children. They were devoted members of the Allen's Neck Friends Meeting.

Penny Straker

Well-known in our area, Penny graduated from Barnstable High School and went on to study at the Yale School of Forestry. She owned and operated several businesses: creating and publishing knitting patterns, designing beautiful gardens, and restoring antique homes. Penny was a lifelong equestrian and animal lover, and a devoted and loving mother to her two sons.

Ellie Vasta

Ellie was an explorer and a lover of the outdoors. She was well traveled, visiting nearly every state and many European countries, often with her husband Joe. She passed that love along to her son Joseph, step-daughter Jennifer and grandchildren. Following a successful legal career, including as Assistant Register of Probate for Plymouth Country, Ellie and Joe owned and operated AlphaGraphics successfully for 29 years. A friend to many, Ellie could craft a good pun and always tell a joke to bring a smile.

Larry Walder


